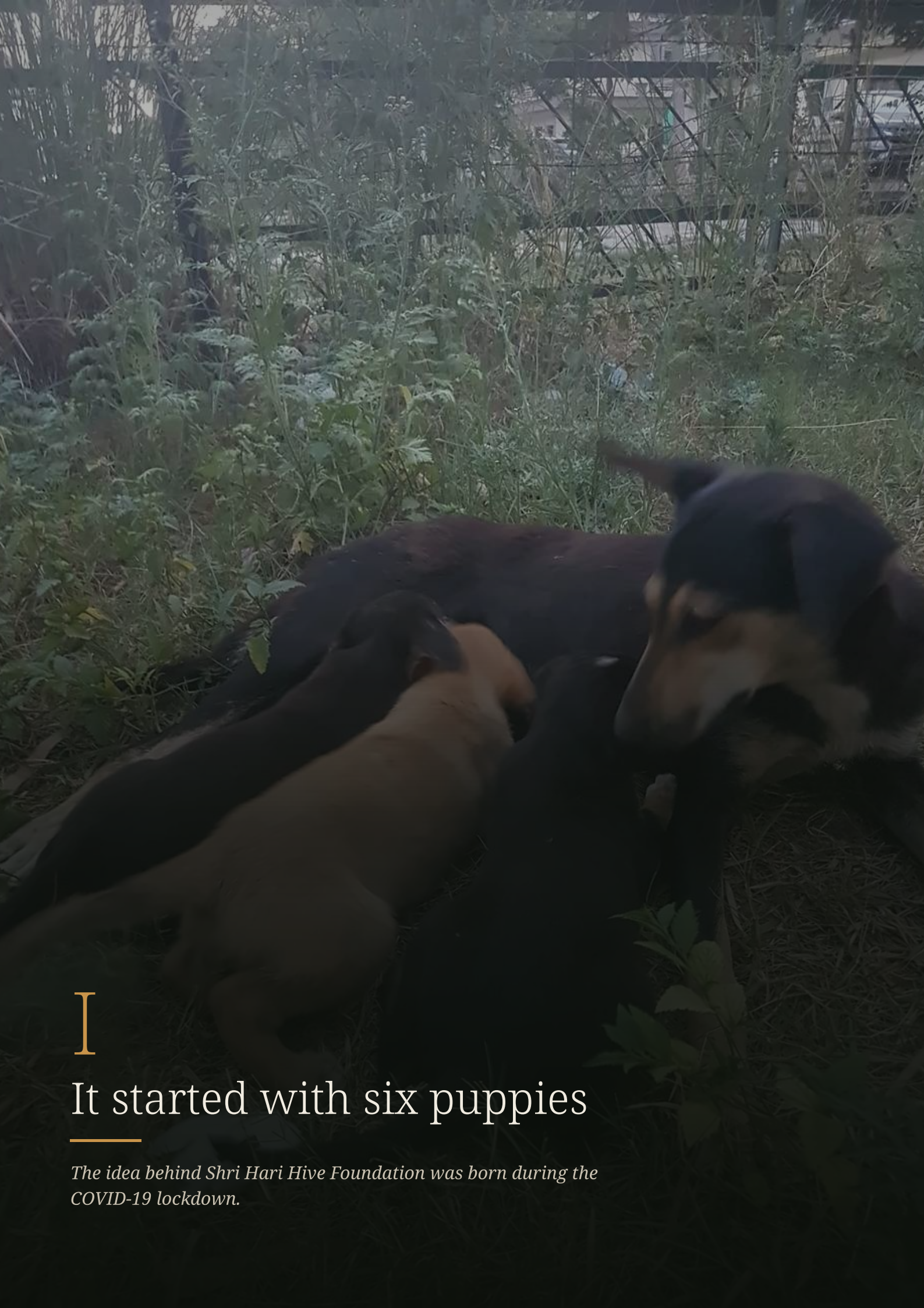

I

It started with six puppies

The idea behind Shri Hari Hive Foundation was born during the COVID-19 lockdown.

When the world was forced indoors, the streets around us became unusually quiet. There were almost no vehicles, no crowds and very little activity. For the first time, many stray dogs could walk freely, without the constant fear of being hit by traffic.

But while the streets became safer in one way, another struggle became more visible: *there was very little food.*

During one of our regular walks near our home, my sister and I came across six tiny newborn puppies. They were barely a week old — playful, innocent and full of energy.

We smiled when we saw them. But then we saw their mother.

She looked extremely thin, weak and exhausted, as though she had been struggling for days to find enough food for herself and her puppies.

We went to a nearby shop and bought biscuits, milk and eggs. That evening, we watched her eat.

It was a simple meal. But for us, something changed that day.

We returned the next day. And the day after that. Soon, feeding them became part of our daily routine.

As the puppies grew healthier, something unexpected happened. Other stray dogs from nearby streets began joining them.

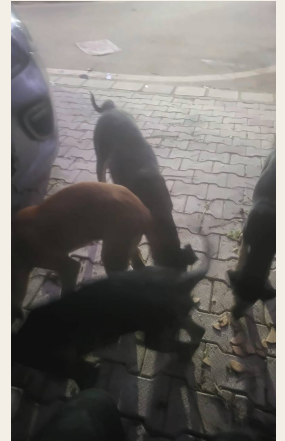
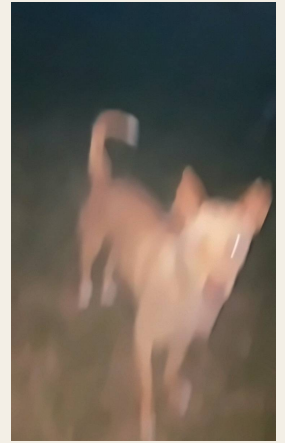
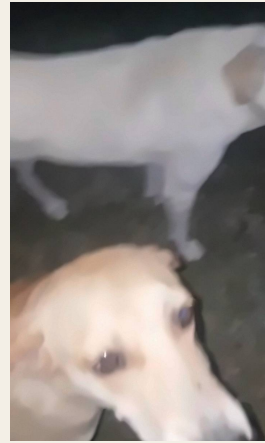
One feeding point became several dogs. Several dogs became a growing responsibility. And a simple act of kindness slowly became a commitment.

My sister and I decided to dedicate a portion of our personal income to feeding and helping the stray dogs around our neighbourhood.

But with time, we realised that feeding was only one part of the problem.

Dogs were being injured. Dogs were becoming sick. Dogs were being abandoned. Dogs were suffering from serious diseases. And there was often nowhere safe for them to recover.

That realisation changed our vision. *We didn't just want to feed them. We wanted to create a place where they could be safe.*

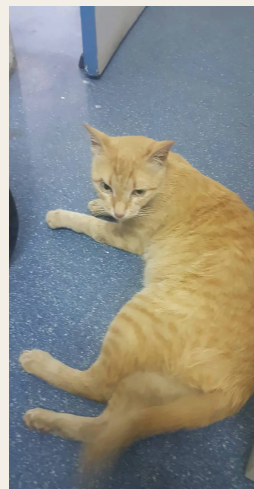

Snowie's second chance

One puppy, twelve days, and a decision not to give up. In the founder's own words.

“One day, I found a tiny puppy on the street. Her name is Snowie. She looked at me with the sweetest little eyes, so I stopped and offered her some biscuits. But she wouldn’t eat.”

“The next day, I found her in a terrible condition. She was vomiting blood and passing bloody stools. We rushed her to the vet, where we learned that Snowie was suffering from Parvo virus and had already been sick for around two days. Her chances of survival were very low.”

“But we couldn’t give up on her.”

“For the next 12 days, we took Snowie to the vet twice every day for IV fluids and treatment. Her infection was stubborn, and there were many moments when we feared we might lose her.”

“But Snowie fought. And finally... she survived.”

“When Snowie was finally healthy, we returned her to her own territory — back to the streets she knew, but this time strong, vaccinated, and alive.”

“Snowie’s story is just one of many.”

“Every day, there are injured, sick, abandoned and helpless animals who need someone to stop, care and say, ‘I won’t leave you.’”

CHAPTER V

The hardest part of rescue

Rescue is not always about picking up an injured animal and taking it to a veterinarian.

Sometimes the animal stays with us for days or weeks. We feed them. We clean their wounds. We give them medication. We sit beside them while they recover. And slowly, an emotional bond develops.

Then comes one of the most difficult moments: *returning a recovered animal to the same streets*

from which it was rescued.

We have experienced this many times. We knew the streets were not always the safest place for them. But without a dedicated shelter, we had limited choices.

That is one of the biggest reasons behind our dream of creating a permanent safe haven for rescued animals.

CHAPTER VI

When compassion meets resistance

Animal welfare work can be challenging. There have been occasions when people have questioned why we feed stray dogs, or why we spend money treating them. There have also been difficult situations and disagreements within communities.

But despite these challenges, we continued.

We believe that protecting animals and maintaining harmonious communities should go hand in hand. Our goal is not conflict. *Our goal is responsible coexistence.*

The number of animals needing help continues to increase. The dogs we serve are spread across different locations, which creates several challenges:

Our personal contribution has carried this initiative for years. But the scale has now reached a point where *personal resources alone are no longer enough to meet the growing need*. And that is why Shri Hari Hive Foundation was created.

We spend crores buying things, dressing up a false smile

—
*while the voiceless companion at the roadside is hungry,
thirsty, troubled.*

*Why does it trouble a person so much to take one coin out
of his pocket for him?*

*We say a human loves a human —
but look closely: how much self-interest hides inside that
love.*

*Perhaps humans have not yet learned true love.
If they want to learn it, let them learn from these innocent
beings.*

*He asks for nothing, yet welcomes you with a wagging
tail.*

Push him away, and he still walks behind you.

*You don't understand his language, he doesn't understand
yours —*

*but the tears in his eyes, the movement of his tail, his
waiting, his touch,
speak far more than words.*

*We think of him as just a creature of the road —
but perhaps he has come to teach us humanity:
selfless love, belonging without conditions, waiting
without self-interest, feeling without words.*

*Remember one thing I say:
before you search for God in a temple, recognise God in
that voiceless companion lying on the road.*

Because perhaps God is asking us —

“I gave you hands — whose hand did you hold?

I gave you a heart — whose pain did you feel?

I gave you life — whose life did you save?”

*So come, wake from this sleep in which we pretend to
sleep while awake.*

*Go within, and you will find no temple outside — only
inside yourself —*

*and from that temple a voice will come: “help the one who
needs your attention.”*

*Because perhaps the real purpose of life is not wealth,
show, greed and attachment —*

*but to stand up for the voiceless being who cannot speak
for himself.*

Everything else is only a false story.

You fight every day.
For money. For respect. For love.
And some nights, you feel completely alone.
You search for peace in places that cannot give it.
But what if there was a place...
...that didn't ask you to be anything?
Just. Be.

That place is Shri Hari Hive: a sanctuary for the modern soul, with a home for street dogs at its heart. Not a resort, not a temple town — a few acres of forest, water and mud where a tired person can sit in the dirt with a dog and remember how to be present. The two halves are inseparable. The dogs are not an attraction, and the retreat is not a fundraising device. *The dogs are the teachers.*

Earth, trees, water and silence. No marble floors — just mud under your feet. No luxury suites —

just simple huts where you sleep to the sound of the forest. Here, ancient wisdom isn't taught in classrooms. It breathes in the air, flows in the stream, and lives in the eyes of the animals who will call this place home.

We do not have this land yet. Finding and securing it is the first big milestone on the road ahead — and every picture in this chapter is an artist's impression of what we will build on it.

1 The Temple

A small white shrine at the centre of the grounds, on a round stone plaza, where each day begins and ends. Open to everyone; nobody is asked to believe anything.

2 Gathering by the Temple

The open ground around it: for sitting together, for music, for silence — for the community that forms around a shared meal and a shared purpose.

3 The Waterfall and the Ponds

Water at the heart of the campus: a fall into a pool with a statue at its centre, a stream, a second pond with a wooden bridge. The sound of the whole place.

4 The Kutias — Meditation Huts

Small mud huts at the edge of the forest, without electricity, where visitors sleep to the sound of the trees and the distant barking of dogs living in the present moment.

5 Outdoor Meditation Area

A round, open pavilion under the trees for the mornings and the evenings.

- 6 The Langar Hall**
An open-air pavilion in the Sikh tradition of community feeding: food prepared with love, everyone eating together on the same level, whoever they are — and the dogs fed from the same kitchen.
- 7 Organic Farm & Garden**
Hands in soil, seeds to table. The farm feeds the langar.
- 8 The Healing Clinics**
The animal clinic beside the dogs' ground, and a second clinic among the huts.
- 9 The Animal Care Centre**
The dogs' home inside the ashram — shelter, medical unit, quarantine, kitchen, puppy & mother care, sterilisation, open run, rescue response. The next chapter is about it.
- 10 The Forest and the Paths**
Stone paths, streams, old trees. Everything built to sit inside the natural world, not on top of it. No marble floors — just mud under your feet.

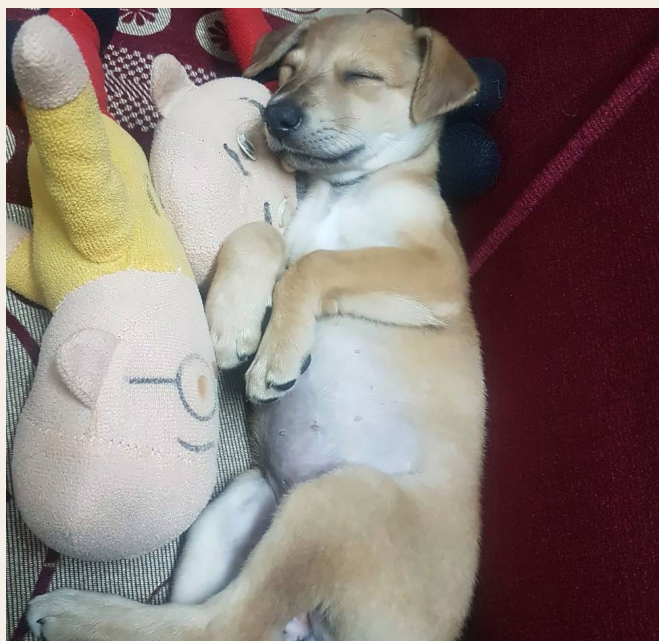
